


## In Conversation With | Former Chief Negotiator Dr. Christian Pauletto

## Seminar | Modern Slavery (with SD Strategies)

This one-hour interactive workshop will provide an overview of modern slavery – what it is, where it occurs and why it is increasing. The workshop will outline key modern slavery risk factors including geography, industry sector and commodity and explore specific vulnerabilities associated with people becoming trapped in modern slavery globally.

Participants will be encouraged to identify the key modern slavery risk in their own country and take part in building a Miro Board to capture risks and vulnerabilities prevalent in the jurisdictions represented at the Symposium.

We will explore business drivers for better assessing and addressing modern slavery risks — including the changing global legislative landscape, customer and investor pressure and reputational impacts. Case studies will provide participants with an understanding of what actions companies are taking to manage and mitigate modern slavery risks in their operations and supply chains.

## Careers | Working for an NGO

In this session, Simon Henderson will outline the challenges and opportunities of working in NGOs in Australia and overseas, and the fulfilling career it can provide. In particular, he will focus on what it is like working in human rights organisations in advocacy roles, outlining the types of skills that are valued in the sector and the opportunities available. Simon will also speak to the differences in working in a small NGO with just a handful of staff, right up to a global INGO with thousands of staff.

As part of the session, Simon will speak to examples of advocacy work he has undertaken throughout his career, such as; seeking changes in laws to support marriage equality, advocating against extradition proposals that led to the mass protests in Hong Kong in 2019, to calling for targeted human rights sanctions reforms through Magnitsky style laws, and more. In doing so, he will outline the various obstacles he has faced, the rewarding experiences and some tips on how to pursue a career in the NGO sector.

## In Conversation With | Future of Atrocity Risk and Prevention

The seminar will present innovative new research from two early career researchers.

Sascha Nanlohy will present on his research investigating the role of external powers in genocide and the role of military assistance. He will reflect on the importance of future leaders understanding this dynamic given increased risks of mass atrocities stemming from rising authoritarianism, great power competition and the climate crisis.

Rhiannon Neilsen will then examine the role of 'humanitarian technologies' – such as satellite imagery, mobile apps, and crowd-source mapping – in the context of preventing atrocity crimes in the 21st century. Whilst not dismissing the importance of existing humanitarian technologies, her paper gives thought to how more proactive uses of cyber-capabilities might be used to protect populations. To do so, she introduces what she calls 'cyber-humanitarian interventions' that aim to disrupt perpetrators' means and motivations for atrocities.



## Interactive | Pandemic Response Simulation

This session will involve a simulation set in today's covid-19-infected world, noting that there is no reason that another, similar outbreak could not happen again tomorrow, meaning the governments, companies and international institutions of the world would be contending with not one, but two viral or bacterial outbreaks at a similar scale simultaneously. Indeed, as we can see with the Delta variant, COVID-19 itself might mutate in ways that make it significantly more lethal and contagious. Plagues have played a pivotal role in history, as told by, among others, Thucydides' telling of events during the fifth-century BC Peloponnesian War, Barbara Tuchman's account of the 14th Century Black Death, or Samuel Pepys' description of the Great Plague of London in 1665. These stories – and, indeed, the fictional La Peste, by Albert Camus – give an indication of how bad things can get (hint: we are nowhere near it – yet).

Participants will take part in groups representing affected states and other actors as a new *peste* breaks over the top of COVID-19. What policies will you recommend? How will you decide among them? How will you negotiate with other groups?

#### Seminar | Conflict in the South China Sea

Over the last three years, China has moved on from its completed island building and militarisation campaign in the South China Sea, which is largely complete. Its focus has shifted to using those island bases to project power short of war — in the so-called "grey zone" — against its neighbours. Dozens of China Coast Guard and hundreds of Chinese maritime militia boats forward deployed to the Spratly Islands now patrol the waters of the Philippines, Malaysia, and Vietnam continuously, steadily forcing civilian actors out of contested waters.

In this session, Gregory Poling will explore how remote sensing technologies reveal this activity and what the future holds in the South China Sea.
